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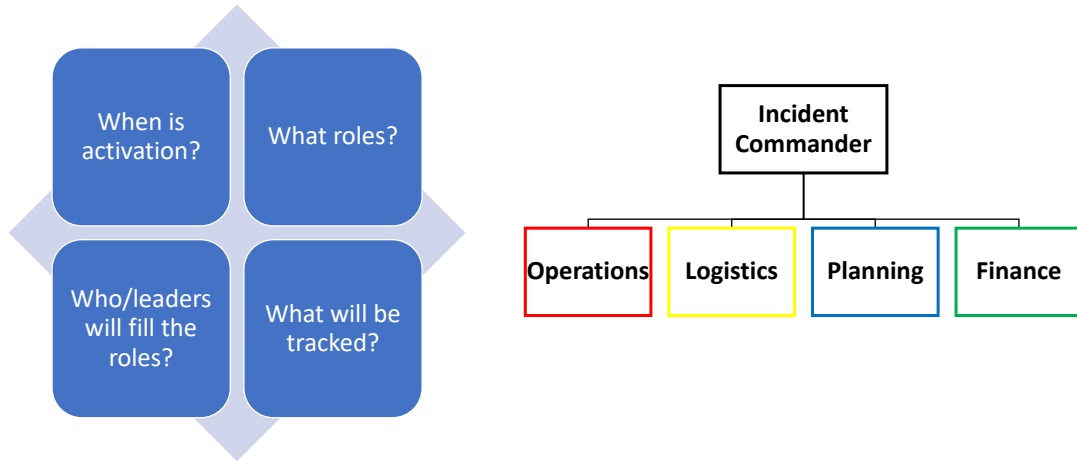

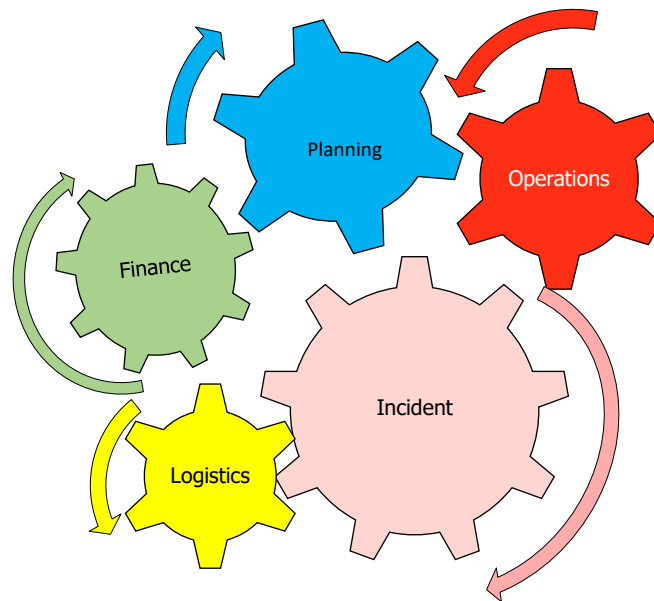
Your organizational Operations/Command Center



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Isolate

- Incident-specific expenses in single cost center/index

Control

- Identify person(s) for expense approval
- All incident specific expenses must be signed for approval by Associate CFO

Repo^{DB2}

- Develop and share

Collect and catalogue all Purchase Orders and Invoices

- Create **custom** categories to align with FEMA Projects
- PPE (by item description); Testing, Facilities & Alternative Sites, Vaccine (by vendor)
- Not perfect, but **explainable**

Coordinate

- Accounting for validation documentation (check numbers, bank statements)

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Commandeer a cost center/index

- Labor activity track & record
 - Management
 - Clinical
 - Non-clinical
 - Labor Pool
 - Travelers and contractors

Categorize by Activity

- Lab Testing
- Operations
- Vaccine Efforts

Note: Unable to isolate and parse out COVID patient care costs on ICU units (individual cost centers/indexes) due to **evolving** nature of effort

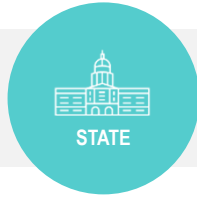

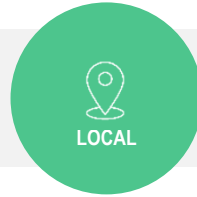

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COVID-19 Healthcare Cost Recovery Strategy

Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act

The CARES Act authorized more than \$2T in federal aid to address the pandemic and its economic effects, including direct support for hospitals. The legislation established:

- Medicare IPP Add-on payment
- Delayed reduction in Disproportionate Share Hospital (DSH) programs
- Payroll tax delay program
- Employee retention tax credit
- Supplemental Hospital Emergency Preparedness Program funding
- Medicare Accelerated payment program
- Workforce Telehealth award program
- Public Health and Social Services Emergency Fund (Provider Relief Fund)
- Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Disaster Relief Fund

Provider Relief Fund (PRF)

Through the CARES Act and later the Healthcare Enhancement Act and Paycheck Protection Program, the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) obligated nearly \$120B from the PRF to more than 410,000 providers¹.

- Funding meant to cover health care related expenses and lost revenues attributable to COVID-19
- Payments made directly to providers based on net patient revenue and included general and targeted fund allocations
 - COVID-19 high impact areas
 - Rural providers
 - Safety net providers
 - Children's hospitals
 - Skilled Nursing facilities
 - Indian Health Services
 - Treatment for the uninsured
 - Vaccines for the uninsured
